Introduction

The world is ageing rapidly. The number of people 65 and older is projected to triple from 531 million in 2010 to 1.5 billion in 2050. By 2050, most countries would be trading in their young for the old as the share of their population that is 65 and older surpass those 15 and younger. This demographic shift is accompanied by wider changes in the society including continuing low fertility rates, late marriages, preference for singlehood and migration amongst others. Whilst longevity is a definite cause for celebration, societies worldwide are still grappling with the "how to" of harnessing its potential and possibilities, a critical endeavour as family sizes shrink and increased life expectancies challenge existing infrastructures.

Successful adaptations turns on the resilience of the individual, family, and society, yet, what exactly is resilience for the ageing person and the ageing society.

The conference aims to answer these questions as it deliberates on ways of defining and measuring resilience. It will also feature successful strategies and approaches to enhance the resilience of older adults, their families and communities at all levels including physical, psychological and social.

Themes

What is resilience – explorations of the different types of resilience from physical, mental to financial, social and other dimensions

How should resilience be measured

What are the factors that impact on resilience - the adverse episodes, stressors

What are the factors associated with resilience – age, gender, ethnicity, health and well being, self perceived health, relationships and social networks, personal characteristics, others

What are the measures to promote resilience – at policy and programme levels

POST-CONFERENCE WORKSHOP

Longitudinal Data Analysis in Ageing Research

Over the past decade the availability of longitudinal data on older adults has increased significantly. One of the difficulties facing longitudinal data is attrition. In this workshop we address how attrition can be handled in longitudinal data sets. We discuss ways to avoid attrition including strategies to keep respondents on the panel. In addition, we discuss ways to handle attrition in analysis of longitudinal data. The workshop also covers issues of missing data and imputation. Data from the Panel on Health of Singaporean Elderly (PHASE) will be used. This dataset has 3 waves and is available for analysis upon request (after the workshop).
