Abstract

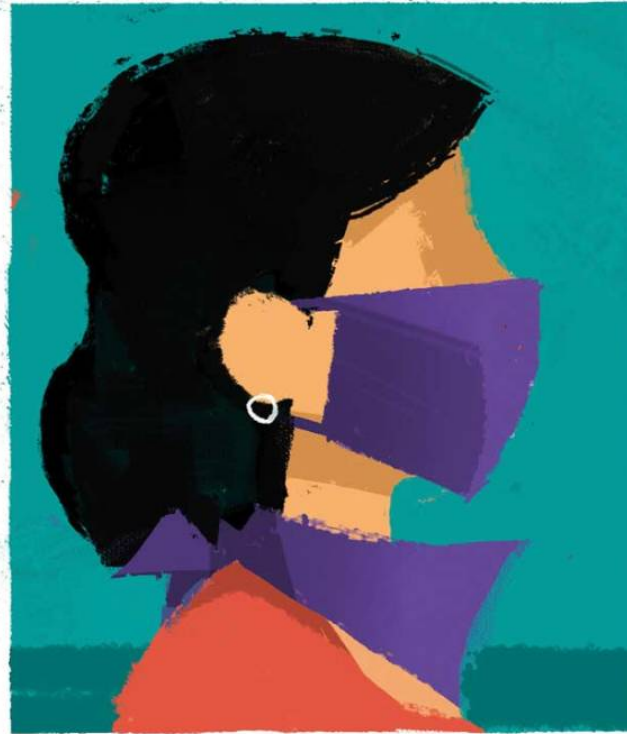
- Some of the most pressing issues are the extent of restrictive measures, and the reciprocal duties to healthcare workers and access to reproductive health.
