“Before there was a palace on this wahipana or historical site, this 11 acre parcel of land according to legend once somewhere held a shrine to Ka’ahupahau, the female shark akua or deity that once protected O’ahu’s bays. This ‘ahu or shrine was later turned into a heiau by the name of Ka’ahaimauli, before again being converted into a heiau dedicated to Lono. After the collapse of the Kapu or Hawaiian religious system in 1819, the land was cleared of the heiau and became frequented by travelers and missionaries.” – Native Stories

Waikiki was once rich with agricultural fields and plentiful fish from the reefs. The name "Waikiki" translates as the "spouting waters" because of the many streams that flowed from the mountains through the valleys to provide fresh water which fed the low land crops."* Check it out at: <https://nativestories.org/waikiki-wt/> and don't forget to download in advance if you won't have wifi or cellular access during your walk.
